

- Alarm or Announcement
- Designated Assembly Areas 2
- Evacuation Routes & Emergency Exits
- Shelter-In-Place
- Assistance with Employees with Disabilities
- Accounting for Employees





Accounting for Employees

Assembly area

- $_{\circ}\,$ Must be able to identify staff and visitors safely evacuated
- Each department leader must maintain a list of department's personnel
- Visitors to be assisted to assembly area by their host
- Everbridge technology that can save lives





CALL 911





Possible Hazardous Material Incidents

- Train Derailment
- Natural Gas
- Hazardous Chemicals

- Hazardous material (HAZMAT) incidents
 - Evacuation, or
 - Shelter in place.
- HAZMAT team determines the best action depending on chemical and amount spilled.
- Natural gas leak inside building
 - Evacuate immediately if safe to do so
 - Beware of ignition sources
 - Follow EAC instructions



Fire Emergency

- Threat from Smoke or Fire
 - Sound alarm (if there is one in your building)
 - Call 911 when safe to do so
 - <u>Calmly</u> exit the building
 - <u>Don't waste time</u> for personal or other items
 - Close doors (do not lock) to help confine the fire





Severe Weather

Tornados and High Winds

- Warning will go out via Alert Denton, cell phone warning service, any weather apps, and the outdoor sirens.
- Know where your Shelter-in-Place is located
- Lightning
 - 30/30 Lightning Safety Rule or Department Specific Procedures
- Winter Weather and Freezing Temperatures
 - City closures are announced via City social media.
- Flooding



RESPONSE TO BOMB INCIDENTS

TYPES OF BOMB THREATS

Written/Verbal: Telephone, Email, Mail
Telephone is the most common threat

Abandoned/Unattended Item

Suspicious Package/Explosive Device

BOMB THREAT BY TELEPHONE

- Be calm, courteous and listen
- Do not interrupt caller
- Write down information about the caller
- Try to keep the caller talking
- Call 911 when possible

INFORMATION ABOUT THE CALLER

- Caller ID information (name and/or number)
- Time of call
- Speech characteristics (accent and/or language)
- Mannerisms
- Background noise
- Gender and approximate age
- Did caller indicate knowledge of the facility

IF POSSIBLE ASK QUESTIONS

• What kind of bomb is it?

• When is the bomb set to explode?

• Where is the bomb located?

• How is the bomb set off?

BOMB THREATS

Electronic (Email)

- Leave the message on the computer screen
- Call 911

BOMB THREATS

Written

 Do not handle the note of packaging unnecessarily

• Treat all material as evidence

• Call 911



CONFIRMED SUSPICIOUS PACKAGE/EXPLOSIVE DEVICE

Police and Fire


- Evacuate area
- Observe area for secondary devices
- Do not move or handle item
- Pictures if safely possible
- Call Bomb Squad for assistance

Bomb Squad

- Render Safe
- Investigate incident

WHAT YOU SHOULD NOT DO

- Touch package
- Shake package



ABANDONED/UNATTENDED ITEM

- Is item appropriate for location
- Attempt to locate owner
- Abandoned/Unattended item remove from area
- Unable to rule out abandoned or unattended item, consider suspicious
- Suspicious Call 911

SUSPICIOUS PACKAGE/EXPLOSIVE DEVICE

- Out of place for area
- No one knows anything about item
- Location of item
- Hidden
- Item just looks suspicious
- Unusual writing or shipping information
- Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or military type device



STEPS TAKEN FOR BOMB THREAT

- 1. Employee calls 911 Dispatching
- 2. Police Department respond and investigateNotify Bomb Squad of Incident
- 3. Bomb Squad assist if needed

OUR RESPONSE TO BOMB THREATS

Property manager decides action taken to threat

1. No action taken to threat

- 2. Search
 - Use personnel familiar with property
 - K-9's ?
 - Use radios appropriately
 - Evacuate, if warranted

OUR RESPONSE TO BOMB THREATS

3. Shelter-in-place

4. Evacuate immediately

- Search evacuation area prior to evacuating
- Use alternate locations for evacuation


Situational Awareness


